Where will Redeemer be 13 vears from now? Where will Redeemer be 26 years from now? Where will Redeemer be 39 years from now? Why did I choose those numbers rather than 15. 25 and 40? The Charter for Redeemer was signed in 1979, which was 39 years ago. Do you think those Charter members had envisioned what Redeemer now looks like 39 years into the future? Have you thought ever about what Redeemer could look like 39 years from now?

I am sure there are some who first thought: I will not even be here in 39 years so why should I care? Frankly I will not be here in 39 years either. As to the question, "why should I care?" I doubt there would be a Redeemer Lutheran Church in SCC except that those initial Charter members cared. All of the growth to the physical structure and to the people and relationships started because those Charter members cared. Since 1979 we have been standing on their shoulders as a congregation. On April 1, 2019, Redeemer will have existed (officially) for 40 years. On Sunday, March 31, 2019, we will celebrate what those Charter members began.

At the beginning of 2018 our Council continued an annual process of thinking about what Redeemer will look like 10, 20, 30, 40 and even 50 years from now. Part of that discussion meant looking at the past and present while we planned for the future. We talked about Core Values, our Mission Statement and a Vision Statement for who we hope to be and what we hope to accomplish. Some of that Vision is already happening. How will you fulfill your role in God's Mission for Redeemer? I am a firm believer that God brought you to this congregation for a reason. Every Sunday, or for some maybe every day, we recite the Apostle's Creed which begins with the first article: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

As part of the explanation under "What does this mean?" in the catechism Martin Luther writes, in part, "In addition God daily and <u>abundantly</u> provides shoes and clothing, food and drink, house and farm, spouse and children, fields, livestock, and all property – along with all the necessities and nourishments for this body and life."


Many churches and church goers often <u>under</u>-utilize that word, "abundantly." We tend to think more in terms of scarcity. We live in fear of not having enough for ourselves. We think, "*If I give away my money or possessions, then what will happen to me when I need something*?" Martin Luther teaches that God will abundantly provide "*all the necessities and nourishments for this body and life.*"



Last December this congregation passed a spending plan for 2018 that stretched our thinking. Some of our church goers reacted from an attitude of scarcity. There was fear that we would be asking too much of each other and God. Frankly speaking, if you believe God is only able to do what you can accomplish by yourself, then your God is too small. A little more than half of 2018 has passed and, as of this writing, giving continues to exceed spending. God is good all the time and we have been responding to God's good gifts in our lives.



We want to thank each and every one of you for believing in God's abundance and in the Vision God has for Redeemer. In this second half of 2018 we ask for your continued support through your prayers, spiritual gifts and your financial gifts. The Apostle Paul writes, "Let the one who boasts boast in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 1:31, NIV). So we boast in the Lord at your faith that God will abundantly give us "all the necessities and nourishments for this body and life."

Tips for smart over-the-counter (OTC) medicine use

The more than 300,000 OTC medicines that you can buy without a prescription all have one thing in common: they are serious medicines that need to be taken with care.

1. Always start by reading the label-all of it.

Reading the label will help you decide if you have selected the right product for your symptoms, and for you to understand the dosing instructions and be aware of any warning that may apply to you.

2. Look for an OTC medicine that will treat only the symptoms you have. Some products are for one symptom (i.e., cough medicine) and some are for multiple

symptoms (i.e., cold medicines that can treat headache, stuffy nose and cough). "More" does not necessarily mean better if the medicine is treating conditions you don't have. Select a medicine that treats your specific symptoms.

- 3. Know what to avoid while taking an OTC medicine. Like prescription medicines, all OTC drugs can cause side effects or reactions. Read the label to see what to avoid while you are taking an OTC drug.
- 4. When in doubt, ask before you buy or use an OTC medicine. Taking an OTC medicine safely is too important for guesswork. If you have questions, ask your pharmacist or doctor.
- 5. **Take the medicine EXACTLY as stated on the label.** When it comes to OTC medicines, more is not better! Taking too much of a nonprescription medicine can be harmful. Only take the recommended amount and at the exact intervals stated on the label.
- 6. Use extra caution when taking more than one OTC drug product at a time. Many OTC medicines contain the same active ingredients, (i.e., the same pain reliever you take for a backache may also be in cold medicine), which means you may be getting more than the recommended dose without even knowing it. Always compare active ingredients before taking more than one OTC medicine at the same time.
- 7. Don't combine prescription medicines and OTC drugs without talking to a healthcare professional first.

Sometimes combining drugs can cause adverse reactions or one drug can interfere with the other drug's effectiveness. Always ask your doctor or pharmacist to play it safe.

- 8. Keep a list of all the OTC medicines, prescription drugs, dietary supplements and herbal remedies you take, listing the active ingredient(s), and reason for taking each one. Share this list with your healthcare providers at each visit so they can check for any possible drug interactions or side effects. In case of an accident or emergency, make sure a loved one has an up-to-date copy of your medicine list too.
- 9. **Don't use OTC medicines after their expiration date.** Dispose of all medicines promptly and safely after their expiration date and be careful not to throw them away where children or pets may find them.


Big News!

Redeemer Lutheran Church is pleased to offer a preventive health event. Life Line Screening, a leading provider of community-based preventive health screenings, will host their affordable, noninvasive and painless health screenings on 9/10/2018. Five screenings will be offered that scan for potential health problems related to: blocked arteries, which is a leading cause of stroke; abdominal aortic aneurysms, which can lead to a ruptured aorta; hardening of the arteries in the legs, which is a strong predictor of heart disease; atrial fibrillation or irregular heartbeat, which is closely tied to stroke risk; and a bone density screening for men and women, used to assess the risk of osteoporosis. Register for a Wellness Package which includes 4 vascular tests and osteoporosis screening from \$149 (\$139 with our member discount). All five screenings take 60-90 minutes to complete. There are three ways to register for this event and to receive a \$10 discount off any package priced above \$129.


