A message from Pastor Allman by Pastor David Allman

Today is Maundy Thursday! Well, maybe not “today” the day you are reading this; rather “today” as in the day I am writing this article. Maybe you were wondering what we, at the office, do during Holy Week. Wouldn’t your guess be that we are preparing the May newsletter? This morning (again, my “this morning” and not your “this morning”) Kadie is asking me if my article is done yet, and it pains me to keep putting her off because she has a lot of work to do too.

I tell you that story to have you help me wonder. Most of the world today is involved in multi-media presentation: television and radio are still viable options, although maybe not for long; while the majority of the world communicates through social networking websites and smart phones. About ten years ago I

signed up for Facebook to stay in touch with our daughter in college. A few weeks ago a pastor told me his 7th-8th confirmation class students said that “Facebook is for old people.” If a social networking website is now considered to be for “old people,” then what would those same 7th-8th grade students think of a paper newsletter and a paper bulletin?

Probably one of the most popular social networking products right now is called Twitter. Maybe you have heard of it and maybe not. Our President is certainly fond of using it. I do not use it. People “tweet” on their smart phones using up to 140 characters. Twitter started in 2006 and by 2012 had 500 million registered members posting 340 million “tweets” per day. In 2019 that number had dropped to 126 million daily users.

In case you are interested, here is a list of the fifteen most popular social networking sites in the world for 2019: Facebook, You Tube, What’s App, Messenger, WeChat, Instagram, QQ, Tumblr, Qzone, Tik Tok, Sina Weibo (China), Twitter, Reddit, Baidu Tieba (China), and LinkedIn. Have you ever heard of them?

Maybe you are not interested. I confess that I am only on one of those. SO, why did I bring it up? Because it shows the direction that communication is moving and how quickly their popularity rises and falls. With those networking sites a person can instantly communicate with a friend, share pictures/videos, share recipes, share craft ideas, get a date for the weekend and even find a job. I imagine there are many more uses, with which I am not familiar. Soon the use

of the printer, copy machine, toner, and paper will be obsolete. And consider where that will leave the greeting card industry, stationary industry, newspapers and the USPS.

I am no prophet, yet I can see the writing on the wall – which these days is my Facebook Wall. “The days are surely coming,” says the pastor, “when Redeemer will have to catch up or get left behind.” That may not happen in your lifetime. It may not even happen in my lifetime. It will, I predict, still happen; and, if we are concerned about whether Redeemer will still be here in 40 more years, then we should all take the future of Redeemer seriously.

Don't expect me to start tweeting out the sermon. I am still electronically challenged. My Smart Phone is smarter than I am. I have, however, managed to set up a Facebook page for Redeemer. If you are a Facebook user you can find the page at Redeemer-Lutheran-Church-579478448758608. You can “Like” the page and receive inspiration and updates for now, until I learn how to do more. After all, in the wisdom of one pastor's youth, “Facebook is for old people.”

MAY STEWARDSHIP

Hebrews 2:1 reads *“We must pay greater attention to what we have heard, so that we do not drift away from it.”*



Having just completed the Lenten season, celebrating the Resurrection on Easter and now in the season of Easter, God's Good News has been front and center of our lives. What about when it is not? Like during the long season of Pentecost, during the summer months when church attendance drops, and people's minds drift toward travel, vacations and leisure activities.

The author of the letter to the Hebrews encourages us, during those times, to pay greater attention so that we do not drift away. Paying “greater attention” is hard work, especially with all of the distractions we have clamoring for our attention. Paying “greater attention” involves focusing our minds, bodies and senses -- everything in us must focus.

Has anyone ever been mixing ingredients for a recipe, watching television and been interrupted by a phone call? After the phone call have you ever gone back to the recipe and could not remember what you had already added and wondered what

was left to add? Anyone ever mistakenly added salt when the recipe called for sugar?

Has anyone ever walked into a room and forgotten what you went in there for? Anyone ever call someone on the phone and once they answer, forget what you wanted to talk about? Anyone ever get in the car to drive somewhere and after a few minutes realize that you are headed to a completely different location -- as if the car had a mind of its own?

There are times when we can get by without paying “greater attention;” and, there are times when paying “greater attention” is very important. Paying “greater attention” to the gospel message from Jesus is very important in order that we do not drift away – as the author of Hebrews says.

Most Christians who stop reading their Bibles, who stop praying, who stop doing devotions, who stop being regular in worship, when asked what happened will likely say something like, “I don't know how it happened. I just sort of drifted away.” Most likely they stopped paying “greater attention” to what they had heard – namely the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Nobody Knows (my medications) by Linda Eargle

There are some things I'd just as soon nobody knows, but the list of my medications in case of an emergency situation is **NOT** one of them. If you live in Sun City Center or one of the independent living areas, such as Freedom Plaza or Aston Gardens, you may have a "vial of life" or refrigerator reminder of your medications. In the case of emergency, providing the emergency responders/emergency room with your information in a timely manner improves your care.

CRITICAL INFORMATION

What information is important for the emergency responders? Birthdate, social security number, past medical history, allergies (medications/foods or environmental factors), medications, and any blood thinners. They also need to know who to contact in an emergency and if you have a Florida Do Not Resuscitate yellow paper signed by your MD. To better determine medication dosage, emergency responders like to know your weight as well.

MEDICATION LIST

Have a medication list that is easily read by the emergency responders. List the medication name, dosage, frequency taken and MD who prescribed it.

Include the medications you are taking currently, so the list needs to be updated regularly. Every time your medications change, make sure your list is updated.

<http://www.sunstarems.com/public-safetypreparing-for-the-inevitable-an-emergency-situation/> has a form on which you can enter your information. Computerizing the information is helpful and makes the information more readable. If you would like an adaptation of the Sunstar form that you can type the information on, **e-mail Linda Eargle at leargle@yahoo.com** or call her (number is in the church directory). For those who are skilled on smartphones, health programs are available any time emergency information is needed. On the iphone, enter the information on the Health app (white square/red heart). Anyone can access this information without requiring your passcode. I have my birthdate, allergies and emergency contacts available on the app.

AED Demonstration

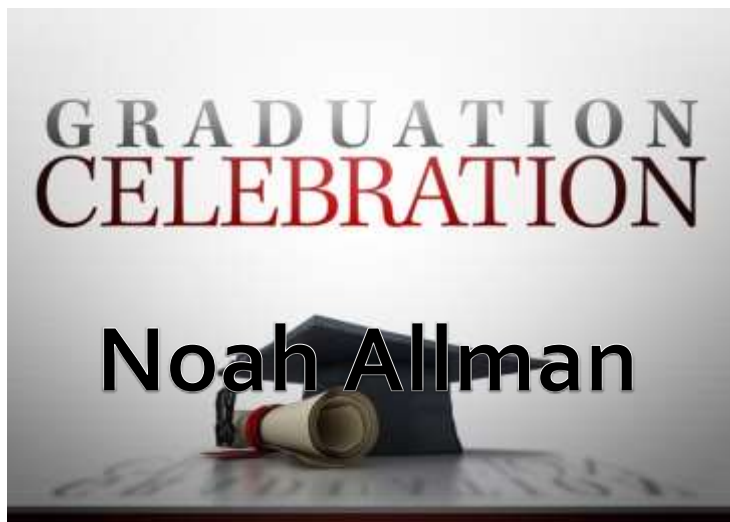
Do you know or remember how to use the AED (automatic external defibrillator)? The company representative will be here to do a demonstration for our units on Wednesday, May 29th at 1:30 PM. This is for those who do not know how to use the AED as well as a review for those who attended the demonstration last year.



An AED is a lightweight, portable device that automatically delivers an electric shock through the chest to the heart after it analyzes the heart rhythm and determines it is needed. You do not need medical training to use one as the equipment will walk you through the steps. Attending the demonstration will familiarize you with use of our AED. It can be life-saving!!

As a reminder, Redeemer has two AEDs. One is above the counter in the Narthex, the other one is in Buhr Hall on the wall near the women's restroom.
