## A Message from Pastor Allman

School is back in session; buses are operating; we are collecting school supplies; etc. These are all signs that summer is over. This has been a fairly typical summer at Redeemer: in-person attendance has dropped; offerings are down; ministry teams postponed meeting; while expenses have remained constant or increased.

Even though this has been a common experience over my thirty-seven years of ordained ministry, it still is worrisome. Redeemer folks have traditionally made the up differences of expenses over offerings before the end of the year, yet this is still worrisome. Redeemer folks have proven their generosity year after year, yet this is still worrisome.

I completely understand how life sometimes happens. Sometimes

I arrive for worship on Sunday morning and realize that I forgot to write out my offering check. Has this ever happened to you? Sometimes, another week goes by and my mind fills with stuff I need to get done, and I arrive for worship on Sunday morning and realize that I forgot to write out my offering check again. Maybe that only happens to me two weeks in a row. Sometimes I find myself behind on my estimate of giving, so I need to write a "make-up" check for my missed offerings.

That may not happen to you. If it does, please know that I completely understand, because it happens to me too. Also, please be assured that what you give is strictly between you and God. No one at Redeemer is tracking you to see if you are "giving enough!" Each year we encourage Redeemer folks to

have a conversation with God about how much the two of you decide to give in offering. We do encourage Redeemer folks to complete an estimate of giving card, yet no one is checking to see if you did. This year's stewardship emphasis will encourage you and God to have a fresh new conversation about your offering.

In the months ahead you will read and hear more about Consecration Sunday, which is the stewardship emphasis we have used in the past, so it will sound familiar to many. It focuses more on why it is important to God that believers give back out of what God has given to us. The question each of us is encouraged to consider is, "What is God calling me to do?" That opens the conversation between you and God. No one else can answer that for you. My

encouragement is to open that conversation now, and spend some time with God discerning your current offering and your offerings in 2023. As always, Redeemer thanks you for your generosity.

# SEPTEMBER STEWARDSHIP

"If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil, if you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday. The Lord will guide you continually and satisfy your needs..." (Isaiah 58: 9b-11a; NRSVUE)



Isaiah was speaking to a group of those returning from the Babylonia Exile. Imagine a group of tired, hungry and desolate refugees. Around 50,000 Jews walked approximately 1680 miles over mountains and through deserts. Compare the distance roughly to walking from Tampa, FL to Minneapolis, MN. Even under the best conditions, with people in great health, with an average of three miles per hour, it would consume 560 hours of walking time. Walking 24 hours per day would still take a little more than three weeks.

The refugees arrived in Jerusalem, likely after months of walking, exhausted and probably having suffered injuries and casualties along the way. They have brought little to nothing with them except bare essentials. The city is still in ruins. The Temple is still a pile of rubble. There are people living there, and some will be Jews, along with other ethnicities; yet, remember the exile had already lasted seventy years, so those who "return" likely had never been there before. They have virtually come home, yet it has not yet been their home, and it still shows signs of having been ravaged by war.



How would you feel if you were among them? After thinking about how you would feel; how would you react to God telling you to think of others before yourself: "...offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted..."? I imagine myself thinking, "I really don't have anything offer." The refugees likely felt like they were the hungry and the afflicted. They likely felt like they could not take care of themselves, much less others. Yet, there always seems to be someone worse off, and God challenges us to share, even if it is a meager amount.

"(Jesus) sat down opposite the treasury and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on" (Mark 12:41-44).

# GROWING IN FAITH

What does it mean when God says, "Be still?" No, that is not God's way of telling us to "shut up," although there is virtue in listening instead of doing all of the talking. There is a modern-day proverb that says something about God giving us two ears and one mouth so that we listen twice as much as we talk.

"Be still, and know that I am God!" (Psalm 46:10) is also not about taking a day of rest and going to the beach. Psalm 46 was used during times of trouble and war, so there is a component that encourages us to discover peace when surrounded by trouble. There is an underlying sense of a "wake up" call for people overly focused on problems to turn their attention to God, "...our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Ps 46:1).



Psalm 46 is all about security with God, and that God is our true home. It is mostly written in third-person, although at verse 10 there is a change and God speaks directly to the people (us). God calls us to stop everything we are doing, thinking and feeling and put all of our focus on him. God is higher than all else and able to rule above all.

Have you ever tried to stop everything you are doing, thinking and feeling? I am not saying that is simple. I am saying that is what God wants from us

at times. Some called those times "centering prayer" or "contemplative prayer." It is a time of shutting out everything else and focusing everything within us on God.



I know at least one person right now is thinking/saying, "I could never do that." And, my response is "Yes, you can; because if I could learn how, so can you." There is no 'one right way' to do contemplative prayer. A general suggestion is to sit comfortably with your eyes closed, relax, and quiet yourself. "Be" in love and faith to God. Choose a sacred word that best supports your sincere intention to be in the Lord's presence and open to His divine action within you. It is not complicated; although it does take practice, and in this circumstance, practice is a good thing.

#### Summary of the Guidelines

- 1. Choose a sacred word as the symbol of your intention to consent to God's presence and action within.
- Sitting comfortably and with eyes closed, settle briefly and silently introduce the sacred word as the symbol of your consent to God's presence and action within.
- 3. When engaged with your thoughts (which include body sensations, feelings, images and reflections), return everso-gently to the sacred word.
- At the end of the prayer period, remain in silence with eyes closed for a couple of minutes.

# Help Available 24/7 for Everyone - Text or Call 988 Day or Night


New number means easier access for mental health assistance

Too many people are in need of mental health assistance, and sometimes, it is not easily accessible for everyone. But not anymore. People can call or text 988 or chat <a href="mailto:988lifeline.org">988lifeline.org</a> for themselves or if they are worried about a loved one who may need crisis support whenever or wherever they are.

The <u>Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration</u> (SAMHSA) <u>transitioned the 10-digit National Suicide Prevention Lifeline to the three-digit number</u> to be easier for those in need to access.

The confidential, free, 24-hour-a-day, 365-day-a-year information service is available in English and Spanish. The service provides referrals to local treatment facilities, support groups, and community-based organizations. The new number will also be used for the <u>Veterans Crisis Line</u> for Veterans and their loved ones to access for help.

In 2021, the Lifeline received 3.6 million calls, chats, and texts. That number is expected to at least double within the first full year after the 988 transition. According to SAMHSA, studies have shown that after speaking with a trained crisis counselor, most Lifeline callers are significantly more likely to feel less depressed, less suicidal, less overwhelmed, and more hopeful.


