# A Message from Pastor Allman

The Kingdom of God or Kingdom of Heaven is mentioned more than 80 times in the New Testament. Jesus only mentioned Church three times in two places in Matthew's Gospel. In Jesus' usage, the Church is believers called-out from the community to look after the community's wellbeing. In his book, "Kingdom Come," Rev. Dr. Reggie McNeal says, "By definition the church (ecclesia) referred to people who were never meant to focus on themselves or itself" (page xvi). In what we call the "Lord's Prayer," Jesus taught us to pray, "Thy Come...;" Kingdom SO our question to ourselves must be, "How serious are we about that praver?"

As the "new" Council began in 2023 I asked each of them to enthusiastically pray that God reveal to them God's preferred future for Redeemer. From God's response we will develop shortterm goals (1-2 years) and longrange goals (3-5+ years). I have also asked each of you at Redeemer to enthusiastically pray for God to reveal God's preferred future for Redeemer to our leaders.

The purpose of the Church is to take up where Jesus left off in doing God's Mission in the world. McNeal writes, "...for missional thinkers, church is a verb, a way of being in the world... in short, church is not a thing, it is a who. It is the people of God... Everywhere we go and everything we do is informed by our relationship with God..." (pages 8-9). That includes us at Redeemer. God is not asking the people at Redeemer to fix the whole world. When we think that way, we feel overwhelmed and guit before we start. God is asking the people at Redeemer to discover the needs within the South Shore area that we can help with and do so. The of God's Mission Kingdom involves people helping people experience life as God intends it. That is not simply a platitude, it is the bedrock truth of God's Kingdom.

Sharing the gospel means much more than passing along information about securing personal salvation. Every good deed and expression of goodwill points to the Kingdom of God. McNeal writes, *"The Kingdom narrative is that God is at work in the world today, redeeming and restoring life to its intended*  design. These efforts stretch across all domains of human endeavor. Everyone has the opportunity to get in on God's Kingdom agenda" (pages 57-58).

If you are still alive and reading this, then God is not yet finished with you, and you have an opportunity to get in on God's Kingdom agenda. The first step is to enthusiastically pray for God to reveal God's preferred future for you; and, commit to taking that first step.

According to recent statistics, the fastest growing segment of the U.S. population is people who are 80 years and older. These "Super seniors" are forging new ground in aging. Some model an active lifestyle. Others have a zest for life -- from a walker or wheelchair! -- that is contagious. The super seniors who lead ministry teams and congregations, quilt, knit and crochet; or greet others with a smile are potential role models.



However, even a supportive environment of super seniors will not provide enough fuel to power Redeemer's future indefinitely. We <u>all</u> must be open to ongoing service in God's Kingdom. Each one of us has been created to make a contribution to growing God's Kingdom. There is no retirement plan from serving God; at least not on this earth. God designed each of us to continue making a difference; and, I contend that God has brought each person to Redeemer for a specific purpose – this is your ministry or service at Redeemer, now.

We do not serve in order to earn points toward entrance into heaven. We do not get a pass on the day of accountability. We do not serve God out of guilt or fear, or even because it is a duty. We serve God out of a sense of joy and deep gratitude for what God has already done for us. In Matthew 20, Jesus told his disciples, *"Whoever wants to be great*  must become a servant... That is what the Son of Man has done: He came to serve, not be served..." (27-28, Msg). Pastor Rick Warren writes, "A nonserving Christian is a contradiction in terms" (Purpose Driven Life, page 229).

Paul writes in Ephesians 2: 8-10, "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God — not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we may walk in them" (NRSV). Many people read verses 8-9 and stop there. Yes, we are saved by God's Grace; and God also provides us with a purpose to do good works.

Each of us is going to spend our time in service to something: a career, a sport, a hobby, a leisure activity, power, money, etc. None of those will have lasting, eternal significance. Service in God's Kingdom is a pathway to significance. <u>How long</u> a person lives is not nearly as significant as <u>how</u> a person lives. God gives us abilities, interests, talents, gifts, personality, and life experiences that can all be used to bring glory to God. In 1 Corinthians 12:7 Paul writes, "*The Spirit has given each of us a special way of serving others*" (CEV). What are you passionate about? How can you use that to bring glory to God?

# IN FAITH

We were created to become like Christ. Anyone who is not yet exactly like Christ has room to grow. This is not the same as a desire to be a god. That desire rears its ugly head every time we try to control our circumstances, control our future, control people around us, etc. The desire to be like Christ is the desire to allow Christ to transform our character. Paul writes in Philippians 2:5, "Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus."




God wants each of us to develop the mind of Christ as described in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew, chapters 5-7); that which is listed as the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23); Paul's great love chapter (1 Corinthians 13); and Peter's description of participating in divine nature (2 Peter 1:5-7). As soon as you conform to everything in those Bible sections, we can move on to step two.

Years ago, a youth group held a fund raiser by selling WWJD (What Would Jesus Do) bracelets. They were wildly popular for a season. I do not object to that sentiment, although that only lasts for a moment. Paul teaches that we become like Christ by allowing the mind of Christ to be in us. Imitating Christ for a moment is not long lasting. Allowing Christ to inhabit us generates growth throughout a lifetime. Spiritual maturity develops over time; and does not automatically come with chronological age.

Paul writes, "...present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable act of worship. Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God" (Romans 12:2 NRSV). Your character is known by the sum of your habits; either you are conformed to the world, or you are transformed by Christ.

Being transformed by Christ requires that each of us make the counter-cultural decision to focus on becoming more like Jesus. Millions of Christians grow older yet never grow in faith – being transformed by Christ. I have said before that many people attending Church stopped growing in faith around the age of thirteen, when they made their Confirmation. Spiritual growth is not automatic; it must be intentional. We understand that muscles atrophy over time if they are not used. We can apply that same principle to our spiritual 'muscle;' it will atrophy over time without use.

Christianity is more than a religion or a philosophy. Christianity involves relationship, which produces transformation, which shows in our lifestyles.



#### From the Parish Nurse Team

Remembering When" A FIRE AND FALL PREVENTION PROGRAM FOR OLDER ADULTS How to Prevent Fires



I If you smoke, smoke outside. Provide smokers with large, deep, sturdy ashtrays. Wet cigarette butts and ashes before throwing them out or bury them in sand. Never smoke in bed. Never smoke if oxygen is used in the home.

2 Give space heaters space. Keep them at least 3 feet (1 meter) away from anything that can burn-including you. Shut off heaters when you leave or go to bed.

3 Stay in the kitchen when frying food. Never leave cooking unattended. Wear tight-fitting or short sleeves when cooking. Use oven mitts to handle hot pans. If a pan of food catches fire, slide a lid over it and turn off the burner. Don't cook if you are drowsy from alcohol or medication.

Stop, drop, and roll. If your clothes catch on fire stop (don't run), drop gently to the ground, and cover your face with your hands. Roll over and over or back and forth to put out the fire. Use cool water for 3-5 minutes to cool the burn. Get medical help right away. 5 Smoke alarms save lives. Have smoke alarms installed on every level of your home, inside each bedroom, and outside each sleeping area. For the best protection, use interconnected alarms so when one sounds, they all sound. Make sure everyone in your home can hear the smoke alarms. Test the alarms monthly.

6 Plan and practice your escape from fire and smoke. If possible, plan two ways out of every room in your home and two ways out of your home. Make sure windows and doors open easily. If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside.

T Know your local emergency number. Your emergency number may be 9-1-1 or the fire department's phone number. Once you have escaped a fire, call the fire department from a neighbor's phone or a cell phone.

8 Plan your escape around your abilities. Have a telephone near your bed in case you are trapped by smoke or fire. Have other necessary items near your bed, such as medications, glasses, wheel chair, walker, scooter, or cane.


