A Message from Pastor Allman

The 2023 Synod Assembly was held June 8th - 10th in Orlando. The theme was "Renewed in Christ" and was based on Hebrews 13:6-8, "So we can say with confidence, 'The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What anyone me?' can do to Remember your leaders, those who spoke the word of God to you; consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same vesterday and today and forever."

The largest piece of business was the election of a Bishop, which begins with a blank sheet upon which the name of any clergy, rostered in the ELCA, can be written as the first ballot. Twohundred-eighty-two people wrote in the name Pedro Suarez, and our previous Bishop was reelected on the first ballot for the next six years.

Our keynote speaker was Bishop Patricia Ann Curtis Davenport, Pennsylvania Southeastern Synod of the ELCA. Following the line "Remember your leaders... and imitate their faith." from verse 7 (above) she asked, "Who will replace the leaders who retire?" This seemed to me an appropriate question for Redeemer, as well as the whole of Christianity that is shrinking in membership.

I add to her question, "How will Redeemer

invite/welcome/encourage

leaders?" We think of ourselves as a "welcoming" congregation, yet who can we welcome if we do not first invite? A common response to the request for volunteers seems to be "*I* am retired, it is someone else's turn." Yet, my question in return is, "Who is that 'someone else'?" I can probably count on one hand the number of people at Redeemer who are <u>not</u> retired. Rather than ask, "Who will replace the leaders who retire?" we at Redeemer need to ask, "How do we continue to be leaders in the Church while retired in the world?"

Bishop Davenport challenged us with discovering our "re" (prefix) word that best fits ourselves as individuals and our congregations. She named off a few, too fast for me to keep up. although here are some to ponder: regenerate, renew. rebuild, restart, rekindle, reset, reenergize, rethink, etc. Rene and I discussed some "re" words which may fit ourselves as individuals and our congregation

- "Re"deemer. I wonder which one(s) come to you as you consider for yourself and for Redeemer.

I favor the words reenergize, especially in the aftermath of the COVID Pandemic; and, rethink, especially in terms of our Mission Strategies. Our Mission at Redeemer is to "Proclaim Jesus Christ; Grow in Faith; Love All People." I encourage each of us, individually, to rethink how we are living into those mission strategies in our individual lives; and, then rethink how our individual mission in God's Kingdom can be lived out within the ministries at Redeemer.

How do we, as a Body of Christ in this Southshore region, discover who we are in a community that is becoming less religious? The fastest growing number on the US census, under the category of religious affiliation, is "none." In the 2010 US census it was one in five. In the 2020 US census it was three in five. That is about a 60% increase in ten years. Conversely, in the past 50 years, the number of people in the US who call themselves Christian has shrunk from 90% to 64%; and, from those only about 20% regularly attend worship services.

The situation is not hopeless, yet hope depends on the answer to the question, "What will <u>you</u> do about it?" If not you, then who? How committed are <u>you</u> to God's preferred future for Redeemer? We currently are blessed by the commitment of those who started Redeemer a little more than 44 years ago. Without their commitment and resolve to discern God's preferred future for Redeemer, we would not be here. We are Christ's hands, feet, voices, etc. in this Southshore region. Can we envision where Redeemer will be in 44 more years? What are we willing to do to see it happen?

GROWING IN FAITH

At the 2023 Synod Assembly (June 8th – 10th), during his report, Bishop Suarez talked about the Church's need to have courage for the future. As I said in the Pastor's Page, the future for the Church is not hopeless, although hope will be found in our willingness to courageously walk into God's preferred future for Redeemer.

Bishop Suarez also encouraged us to not fear rebranding (another 're' word) ourselves within the community. Which begs the question, how does this Southshore community brand us? One might say, "Oh, that's the rummage sale place." Or, another might say, "Oh, I remember going there to vote." Or, another might say, "Oh, that's where they had a concert band play." Or, another might say, "Oh, I went there with a friend for movie night." I think the Bishop's point was that we cannot completely control how people from the community brand us, and we should not fear that, although we need to always relate to the community with the love of Jesus Christ.

Bishop Suarez shared a statistic that claims 1000 new people (mostly retired) are moving to Florida each day. He also said that, as he travels around Florida, he is overwhelmed by how many new developments have been or are being built. We can attest to many new developments in this Southshore region. How will these new residents come to know Redeemer?

Once again, we may need to rethink our Mission Strategies, as I mentioned on the Pastor's Page. "Proclaim Jesus Christ; Grow in Faith; Love All People." How do we live into those as individuals and as a congregation? The best way to do God's Mission is in personal relationships. People can see what we write on the website, on social media, in the newspaper, and on flyers, yet people will come to know us through personal relationship. It will take an effort to proactively create relationships with new residents; and, many of us would favor a passive, impersonal method, such as a mailing or something on the new sign out front. While those are not bad, they do not cultivate relationships.


The easiest way to cultivate a new relationship is to walk up to and speak with someone on Sunday morning, someone you do not already know. And, you can open that conversation with, "Hi, my name is _____. I do not think I know you yet." You can do this before or after worship; which is also a great time to invite them to sit with you during fellowship afterward. Or, you could approach already enjoying fellowship time; someone especially if you see someone sitting by themselves. These are already brothers and/or sisters in Christ, so it is a great place to start. Once you grow in confidence, you can transfer that confidence to speak with someone outside of Redeemer, who Jesus would call "your neighbor."

Don't lose sight of <mark>Glaucoma</mark>




Information for people at risk

What is glaucoma?

Glaucoma is a group of diseases that can harm the optic nerve and cause vision loss or blindness. The optic nerve is a bundle of nerves that carry messages from the eye to the brain. The most common form of glaucoma is primary open-angle, which this informational flyer is about.





What causes glaucoma?

At the front of the eye, there is a small space where clear fluid flows in and out. This clear fluid feeds nearby eye tissue. When the clear fluid flows too slowly, it creates pressure on the optic nerve. This pressure can harm the optic nerve and cause glaucoma and vision loss.



Who is most likely to get glaucoma?

Anyone can get glaucoma, but some people have a higher chance of getting it. People who have a higher chance are African Americans over the age of 40 and anyone over the age of 60 (especially

and anyone over the age of 60 (especially Mexican Americans). If glaucoma runs in your family, you also have a higher chance of getting it.

What are the symptoms of glaucoma?

In its early stages, many times there are no symptoms or pain. As glaucoma gets worse, you may slowly lose your side vision. If it remains untreated, you may miss objects to the side and out of the corner of your eye. It is like looking through a tunnel. Over time, straight-ahead vision may decrease until no vision remains.

How do you know if you have glaucoma?

An eye care professional can tell if you have glaucoma by giving you a comprehensive dilated eye exam. During the exam, drops are placed in your eyes to widen, or dilate, the pupils. Then a special lens is used to look at the optic nerve for damage. After the exam, your close-up vision may be blurry for a period of hours. You may also have a visual field test to check for changes in your side vision.

How can glaucoma be treated?


Glaucoma cannot be cured, but it can be treated to keep it from getting worse. Catching it early is key to protecting your vision. Eye drops and medicine can help your eyes make less fluid or can help drain the fluid from the eye properly. Laser surgery can also make it easier for fluid to leave the eye. Regular surgery can make a new space where the fluid can drain.



What can you do to protect your vision?

Get a comprehensive dilated eye exam at least once every two years. This is more important if you are African American over age 40; are over age 60, especially if you are Mexican American; or have a family history of glaucoma. Finding and treating glaucoma early can help keep the disease from getting worse and reduce your risk of vision loss.

Medicare will help pay for an annual dilated eye exam for some people at high risk for glaucoma. This includes people with diabetes, people with a family history of glaucoma, and African Americans age 50 and older.





A gift from Southshore Community Church

We never celebrate the closing of a Church; although, we can appreciate that God can make something good come from such a sad event. Redeemer has been blessed by the closing of the Southshore Community Church, formerly known as the United Church of Christ, in many ways. First, some of their members have been joining Redeemer for worship and other ministries for many months, and we are glad to welcome them. Second, on June 25th Redeemer was presented with a portion of the proceeds from the sale of the building. Many ministries in Sun City Center are being blessed in a monetary way from their Board Members' decisions. Redeemer has been blessed with an offering of \$20,000.00; and, we extend our gratitude for their generosity toward our ministries in the Southshore area. Obviously, decisions will need to be made for the best way to use this gift to the glory of God. I am sure that such conversations will be happening at future meetings of the Stewardship and Finance Ministry Team and the Congregation Council. Please join us in thanking God for the blessings of these disciples that have joined our ministries and for the monetary gift.

Returning to Communion Practices prior to COVID-19

The Parish Nurse Team, the Worship and Music Team, and the Congregation Council have all agreed that the precautions held over from COVID-19 can be loosened. That being said, we plan to return to pre-COVID communion practices around the Altar Rail. Because we have not done this since March 1, 2020, I wanted to review how we did this before.

The Pastor and one communion assistant will commune each other at the Altar first. The ushers and remaining communion assistants will commune next at the Altar rail, followed by the choir, and then the congregation.

We will return to having four ushers per Sunday. For the gathering of the offering, the four ushers will process to the Altar where the Acolyte will meet them with the offering plates. The ushers will make their way to the back of the sanctuary, pew by pew, passing the offering plates across each pew. After the offering is gathered the congregation will sing the offertory and the ushers will bring the offering forward to be received by the Acolyte.

Just before we begin communion, two ushers will place the center rail and kneeling cushion into the front opening of the Altar rail. Each side will have two ushers in the outside aisles; one to stay up front and one making her/his way back pew by pew. The ushers will count off people as they send them up the side aisle to ensure that we have the right amount of people to fill their side of the Altar rail, and that we do not have people forming too long of a line in the aisles. At the same time the ushers will check with those remaining in the pews to see if they wish holy communion brought to them.

Those coming forward to the rail must decide for themselves whether to kneel or stand. Please remain standing if you are unable to rise from kneeling without pulling on the Altar rail. The Altar rail is not secure enough to use as one would use a safety bar (i.e., bathroom, shower, etc.); especially if multiple people are all pulling it at the same time.

The people coming forward for communion will come to their side of the Altar rail starting at front center, and filling in toward the back of the Altar, so that when they return to their pews up the center aisle, they will not need to scramble past each other in the pews. Each "group" will remain at the Altar rail until the Pastor dismisses them with a blessing. The people at the Altar rail will then return in line up the center aisle to their respective pews.

Communion assistants will distribute either the wafer or the wine/grape juice. We will return to handing the wafer to each communicant; no longer using the contactless wafer apparatus. If anyone is not comfortable with this process, you are free to take the wine/grape juice only, as the next communion assistant comes with the tray of individual glasses. The center section will have grape juice for those who do not wish to have the wine.

For communion assistants: those distributing wine/grape juice will precede the one distributing the wafer to front/center in order that the distribution of the elements goes smoother as we make our way toward the back/side of the Altar distributing the elements to each communicant. Even so, the wafers will be given first, then the wine/grape juice. After each person at the rail has received communion, the Pastor will pronounce a blessing and dismiss those gathered around the Altar rail to return to their pews. Once the participants have returned to their respective seats, we encourage worshippers to spend time in prayer and/or contemplating the gift of Grace provided by God.

After those who are able have come to the Altar rail for the bread and wine/grape juice, the communion assistants will go to those who wish to receive holy communion in their pew. At this same time, two of the ushers will remove the rail piece and kneeling cushion from the center front. Once everyone who wishes to participate has received holy communion, the communion assistants will return to the Altar and cover the elements. Following this the Pastor will invite those who are able to stand and complete this part of worship with a blessing for the gathered congregation. The remainder of worship will continue as printed in the bulletin.

Visitation Volunteers Needed

You may not be aware that Redeemer has more than 50 homebound people. Prior to 2020 and the pandemic, we had two teams of members who would volunteer to visit and/or take Holy Communion to our members who cannot come to Sunday worship. For a variety of reasons, volunteerism has declined in many not-for-profit organizations around the country; which is also true for Redeemer. We have lost nearly everyone who served in this vital ministry. Please prayerfully consider how God may be calling you to visit and/or provide Holy Communion to these homebound members and friends of Redeemer.

Worship Assistants Needed Please consider being an acolyte and/or communion assistant.
