A Message from Pastor Allman

In the Church calendar the season of Advent follows Pentecost; with Reformation (10/29/23), All Saints (11/5/23), and Christ the King (11/26/23) interspersed near the end.

Have you noticed any Christmas items in the stores yet? Retail stores and our consumer mentality have taught us that the season of Christmas now begins right after Halloween, if not before; and, the Christmas season ends after the presents are all opened on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. This may be why many worshippers would rather we jump right into Christmas Carols following Thanksgiving. On the Church calendar the season of Christmas starts Christmas Day and goes until Epiphany.

Advent often begins on the Sunday after Thanksgiving in the USA, although this year it begins on the first Sunday in December; which also means 12/24/23 comes on a Sunday, so we will have the 4th Sunday of Advent worship Sunday morning and Christmas Eve worship Sunday evening.

Advent is all but lost except for the hearty liturgical churches who keep trying to help regular folks understand and remember Advent. Advent is a

season observing a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas, and anticipation of the Second Coming of Jesus, also known as the Parousia.

The term Advent is an anglicized version of the Latin word *adventus*, meaning "coming". Advent is the beginning of the Western Christian liturgical year (Church calendar) and starts on the first Sunday of Advent (12/3/23) and ends Christmas Eve, 12/24/23 with the morning worship.

For Christians, the season of Advent anticipates the coming of Christ from two different perspectives. The season offers the opportunity to share in the ancient (Israel) longing for the coming of the Messiah (Christ in Greek), and to be alert for Jesus' Second Coming (Parousia in Greek). The color for the season is blue, and we use an Advent Wreath with candles for each of the Sundays. The names of the candles may differ by tradition, although generally they represent hope, preparation, joy, and love. The fifth candle is generally the Christ Candle lit on Christmas Day, or sometimes on Christmas Eve.

I hope this helps everyone understand and appreciate the season we call Advent and its importance to our Church calendar.

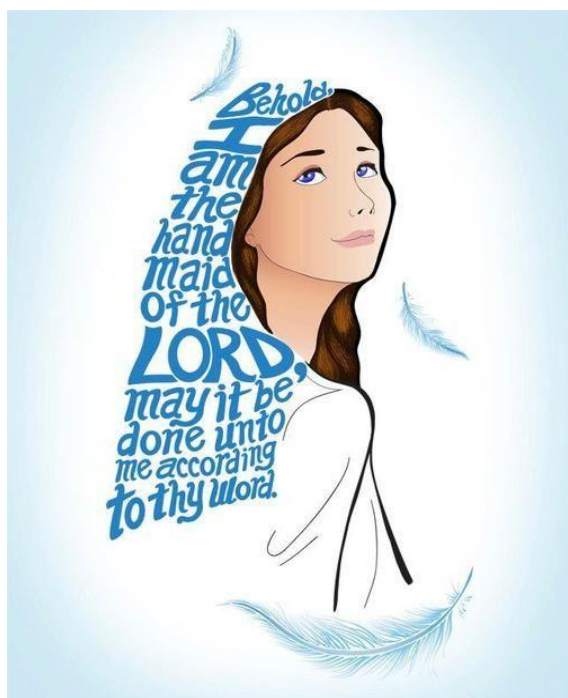

DECEMBER STEWARDSHIP

What does the Christmas Story have to do with Stewardship? When the angel appeared to Mary and they had a conversation about her being chosen to bear God's child, her ultimate response was one of total stewardship: *Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."* (Luke 1:38).



We paint pictures and build nativity sets with Mary looking very peaceful. Think for a moment though what must have been the reality of her situation. A very young, unmarried, pregnant teenager, living in a culture which undervalued women anyway, and she is claiming to be carrying the child of God. Mary's life from the moment of conception forward would have been anything but peaceful.

Mary's life would have been turned upside down. Her pregnancy would have shamed her parents. The people of her village would have shunned her. Joseph, the man to whom she was promised wanted to divorce her quietly. She would have been considered a disgrace and an embarrassment. How many people would have said, "Why me Lord?"

rather than, *"Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."*

In nine months the real beauty and majesty of Christmas was delivered, and God turned the whole world upside down. In the words of the Magnificat, Mary proclaims the hope of every good steward: *"My soul magnifies the Lord"* (Luke 1:46). God's desire is that we too respond with total stewardship (saying "yes") to God's invitation to participate in God's plan for salvation.

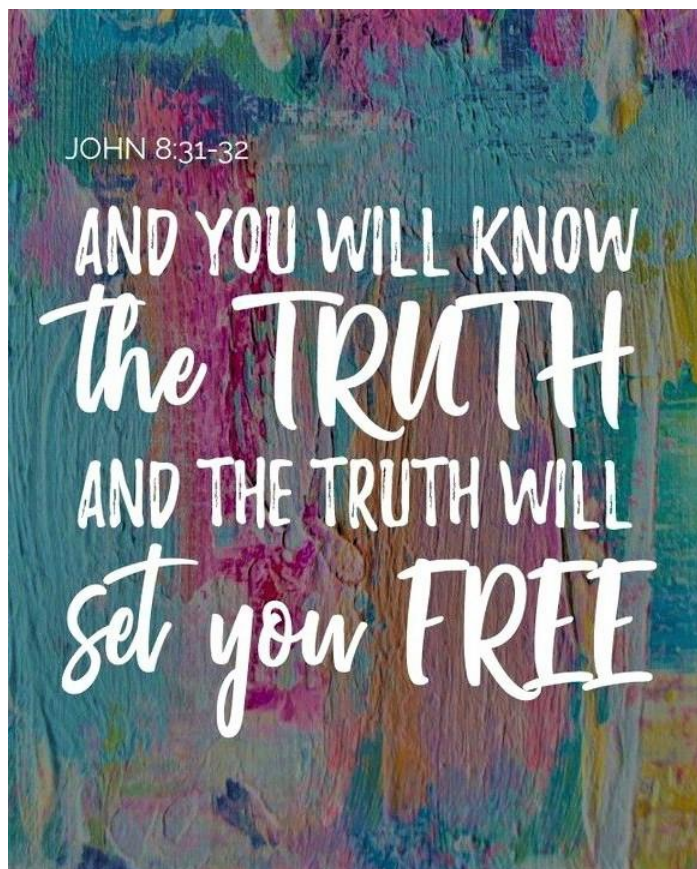


Consumerism, gaudiness, and the excesses of our cultural Christmas can be overcome by answering the call to be God's stewards in this world – especially around Christmas. In a world that seems to desire wealth and gratification above all else, the Christian steward finds hope in the stillness – the silent night – which lies at the heart of Christmas. May our souls also magnify the Lord.



Growing in faith

John 8:31-32 reads, *“Then Jesus said to the ones who had believed in him, ‘If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free.’”*



In a mini Bible study I recorded years ago I spoke about abundance and compared the Thanksgiving feast to a symbol of abundance. We hosted foreign exchange students while our daughter was little, and we experienced Thanksgiving with fresh eyes, because it was a holiday they did not have in their country. Honestly, we never hurt for food, so every day is a smaller version of Thanksgiving because we have an abundance of food.

I wonder if the Word of God has become so available that we can no longer see it with fresh eyes. I imagine that all of us have at least one Bible, and many like me have multiple translations. If you have

a smart phone, tablet or computer then you have electronic Bibles of varying translations with a few simple clicks.

What do we do with that abundance? Has it become so available that we keep it on a shelf; or, like our abundance of food do we store it in a pantry or refrigerator/freezer until we want to get it out? Each year I try to go away to Respite in the Wilderness, which gives me time to put a pause on the busy “pace-of-life” that I have set for myself or perhaps has been set for me. That busyness becomes something that detracts from God’s presence in my life. How about yours?

When I am meeting with people as their spiritual director I listen for a while and often will ask, *“Where is God in all of that?”* Sometimes the answer is something like, *“I know God is always there.”* I think that sounds like, *“I know there is food in the pantry if I get hungry.”*

The above Bible verse from John 8 was part of our Reformation Gospel reading. Reformation is not just something that happened 506 years ago; it is an ongoing part of our Lutheran roots – we are always reforming, or as the ELCA says it, we are always being made new. Notice that Jesus does not tell us, *“If you keep my word on the shelf, you are truly my disciples...”* As disciples we are to ‘continue in his word.’

The second part of Redeemer’s Mission Statement is to “Grow in Faith.” Jesus says we do that by continuing in his word. It forms a present participle, which means it is an ongoing thing which never ends as long as we are alive in this world. How are you growing in your faith? How are you continuing in God’s Word?



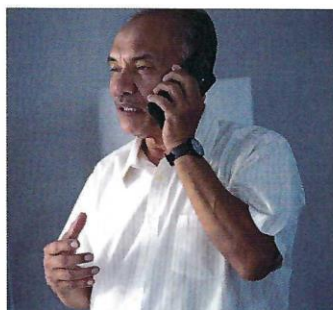

Prayer Shawl Ministry

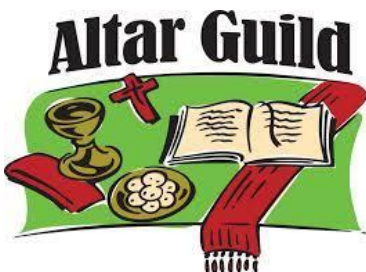

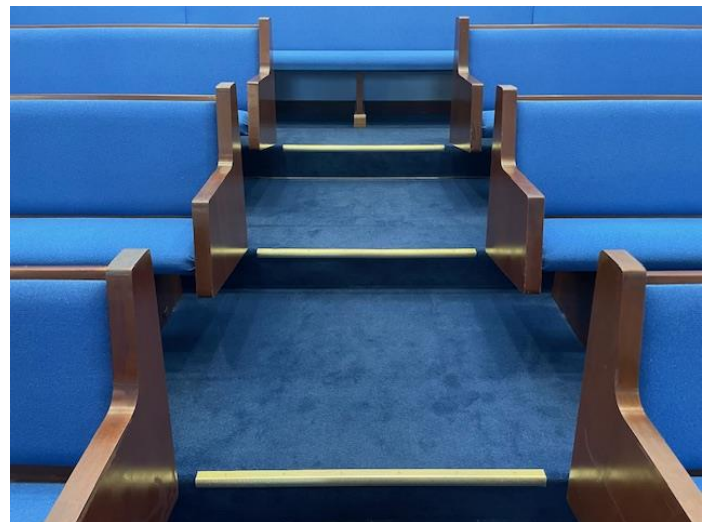
