## A Message from Pastor Allman

Genesis 1:27 (NRSV) reads, "So **God** created humans in his **image**, in the **image of God** he created them; male and female he created them."

That means <u>all</u> people; not just the ones who look like us, think like us, talk like us, worship like us, vote like us, etc. Every human bears the image of God. Someone once said that you will never look into the eyes of another that does not bear the image of God. This is the common denominator that connects with each other, and with God. Please take time to serious think about that for a while.

In his book, "Kingdom Come," Reggie McNeal writes, "Seeing the image of God in all people becomes a central element in how we relate to society from a Kingdom-based perspective... A healthy appreciation for the image of God in people can help us repair the sin of 'us versus them' that separates us from one another. It can help us from dishonoring people...if we view other people as fellow bearers of the divine image, we can connect with them on our mutual interest in life that we all have" (page 107).

My wife and I were talking one evening and wondering aloud how we reached a point in our

society where people feel entitled to treat others disrespectfully; or as McNeal says above, "dishonoring people?" I think there is a pervasive anger among people in our society. I think it brought us to a point where there are those in society who cannot disagree respectfully. I think social media makes that too easy as well; perhaps causing people to believe that commenting on another's post means they can disregard manners and polite or civilized communication. The amount of vitriol I have seen is cringeworthy; and drives me to my knees in prayer.

I think we, yes even some Christians, have abandoned God's Word teaching us that <u>all</u> people are created in God's image, <u>all</u> people are God's image bearers. What if we thought about that before we engaged in vitriol toward another? What would change in our demeanor and word choices, if we considered that we are speaking (writing) to another who bears God's image as well? Maybe we cannot change everyone in society, although I am sure each one of us can change our own thoughts, words, and deeds. After all, God's Word comes to each of us so that we will use it to improve ourselves, not use it to criticize others.

Each week, at least, we pray as the Lord taught us to say, "Thy Kingdom Come; Thy Will Be Done; on Earth as it is in Heaven." Do we mean that? Or, is it just something we say because it is written down in the liturgy, and everyone else is saying it? If we truly hope for God's Kingdom to come on earth as it is in heaven, then – in my humble opinion – it must come within each one of us first.

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# JUNE STEWARDSHIP

Simplicity is neither a new nor a radical idea in Christianity; although, in our western civilization we may tend to regard simplicity as radical because our culture places a high value on acquisition. When Jesus sent out the apostles he told them, "...to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics" (Mark 6:8–9).




To embrace simplicity calls for a radical trust (a.k.a. faith) that does not come easily. Simplicity is not **a** gift; along with the freedom that it brings it is **the** gift. We grow in generosity as we embrace simplicity. We can hold all things lightly and, if need be, let them go — our possessions, our money, our pretensions, even our anger, our prejudices, and our fears. Simplicity cannot be coerced; it must be joyful, and it must be voluntary. We live more passionately because we are set free from the burdensome work of holding on tightly to anything that comes within our grasp.

Simplicity provides a necessary self-emptying so we can live more fully in the presence of God. It affects the way we listen and respond to people and events that impact us each day. Simplicity affects the way we interact with God's Creation, as stewards versus consumers. Simplicity helps to clear our vision in how we read, hear, and live into God's Word and God's Calling on our lives. Simplicity dispels the multiple worldly noises that confuse and distract us from God's preferred future for us.

Simplicity challenges the lifestyle that accumulates possessions, property, and money. Simplicity demonstrates that possessions ultimately possess us. See the story of the "rich young man" in Matthew 19:16-22. Jesus suggests the young man divest himself of his many possessions, and verse 22 tells us, "When the young man heard this word, he went away grieving, for he had many possessions." Grieving is something we do when we lose a loved one. Jesus also teaches in Matthew 6:21, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."



Simplicity addresses our need to fill an emptiness in a different way. The emptiness yearns to be filled, and if we recognize the potential spiritual energy which lies within the heart we can feel at home with this emptiness. Our souls will resonate with the freedom that comes with simplicity. To live presently in the presence of God will be our desire.



# GROWING IN FAITH

"Seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:33, NRSV).

Many believe that every person has a God-size hole, waiting to be filled. Rev. Richard Rohr teaches that God creates the very dissatisfaction that only grace and finally divine love can satisfy. He says that all of us are looking for our True Self, our true home, whether we know it or not; and the journey is a spiral and never a straight line.

Some try to fill the emptiness they feel inside with things other than God's grace and love only to discover the other thing does not provide satisfaction. Some of the things people seek, other than God's Kingdom, do damage and possibly lead to complete destruction; i.e., drugs, alcohol, illicit sex, fame, success, money, possessions, etc. These things may provide superficial pleasure, for a time, yet they lack depth and value.

There are practical ways to seek the kingdom of God and his righteousness, such as worship, prayer, Bible study, and companionship among God's people. Ultimately, as we "Grow in Faith," we move beyond the basic rituals to an inner knowing. In my humble opinion, we move beyond head-knowledge into a soul-to-soul relationship with God. Some religions call this nirvana, bliss, or enlightenment, and others may scoff at this esoteric language; yet when Jesus taught us to seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, I do not think he was referring to some far-off future heaven.



Jesus taught the first and greatest commandment is to love God now, with everything in us; <u>all</u> our heart, <u>all</u> our soul, <u>all</u> our mind. Jesus also invited Christ-followers to abide in his love just as he abides in God's love. These images are all encompassing, ongoing, full time, every day, twenty-four hours per day, seven days per week, three hundred sixty-five days per year, for a lifetime.



Our relationship with God will emerge from within us, much more than from a mere belief system or any belonging system, which largely remain on the outside of the self. Brené Brown calls this longing within us, for a personal relationship with God, a spiritual homesickness. In the foreword to "Falling Upward," by Richard Rohr, she writes, "...when I return home to the place in me where God dwells, I'm no longer interested in making it a quick visit so I can run back to the world..."

As we "Grow in Faith" we discover that the things of this world, including practical religious observances, will not fill that God-sized hole, which causes us to long for that personal relationship with God.

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#### Tips for older adults to drive safely

Maybe you already know that driving at night or in rainy weather is a problem for you. Some older drivers also have problems with certain routes or driving on busy highways, for example. Consider these tips to help you make safe choices about driving:



- Talk with your doctor. If you have any concerns about your health and driving, see your doctor. Don't risk hurting yourself or others.
- **Be <u>physically active</u>**. This will help you keep and even improve your <u>strength</u> and <u>flexibility</u>, which may help your driving abilities.
- Consider your car. If possible, drive a car with automatic transmission, power steering, power brakes, and large mirrors. Newer cars come equipped with backup cameras, which can make parking and backing up easier, as well as other sensors that can alert a driver to a nearby object or vehicle before an accident occurs.
- **Take care of your eyes and ears.** Always wear your glasses or contact lenses if you need them to see clearly. If you use hearing aids, be sure to wear them while driving.
- Avoid driving certain times of day. Cut back on or stop driving at night if you have trouble seeing in the
  dark. Try to avoid driving during sunrise and sunset, when the sun can be directly in your line of vision.
- **Check in with yourself.** Don't drive if you feel lightheaded or drowsy. Be sure to check any warnings on your medications. Try to avoid driving when you are stressed or tired.
- **Don't crowd.** Leave ample space between your car and the car in front of you and start braking early when you need to stop.
- Plan your timing. Avoid heavy traffic areas or rush-hour driving when you can.
- **Plan your route.** Drive on streets you know and find a way to go that requires few or no left turns. Choose a route that avoids highways or other high-speed roadways. If you must drive on a fast-moving highway, drive in the right-hand lane, where traffic moves more slowly.
- When in doubt, don't go out. Bad weather, such as rain, can make it hard for anyone to drive. Try to wait until the weather is better, or use buses, taxis, ridesharing services, or other alternatives.
- Wear seat belts. Always wear your seat belt and make sure your passengers wear theirs, too.
- **Limit distractions.** Eating, adjusting the radio, or chatting can all be distracting. If you use your cellphone while driving (for navigation, for example), use it hands-free and use voice activation when possible. Never type on your phone while driving.

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#### Is it time to give up driving?

We all age differently, and for this reason, there is not one recommended age to quit driving. So how does one know when to stop? To help decide, ask yourself:

- Do other drivers often honk at me?
- Have I had some accidents even if just "fender benders"?
- Am I having trouble seeing road signs, exits, or lane lines?
- Am I still flexible enough to turn my head to check mirrors and blind spots comfortably?
- Have physical conditions or medications slowed my reaction time?
- Do I get lost frequently, even on familiar roads?
- Do cars or pedestrians seem to appear out of nowhere?
- Am I often distracted while driving?
- Have family, friends, or my doctor said they're worried about my driving?
- Am I driving less these days because I'm not as sure about my driving as I used to be?
- Do I have trouble staying in my lane?
- Do I have trouble moving my foot between the gas and the brake pedals, or do I sometimes confuse the two?
- Have I been pulled over by a police officer about my driving?

If you answered "yes" to any of these questions, it may be time to talk with your doctor or family members about your driving, or to consider a driving assessment.
