A Message from Pastor Allman

Have you looked around lately on Sunday morning and thought, "I do not know as many people as I used to?" If so, you are not alone. God appears to be sending new people to Redeemer. In 2023 we had 24 people become members. I wonder if God will top that in 2024. I hope so.

I see Redeemer growing and growth means change, which will make some people feel uncomfortable. As we tell our son, change is our friend. In Redeemer's case, it is a result of God bringing new people into <u>His</u> Church. If God is doing it, how can it be a bad thing?

Pastor Bob Russell is now a retired pastor from Southeast Christian Church in Louisville, Kentucky. Southeast began in 1962 with 53 charter members, and today includes multiple campuses spread throughout the region. God has grown that first congregation to tens of thousands in attendance every weekend, and nearly 40,000 for Christmas and Easter. Many people like to say, "For God all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26b), although I am not sure any of those 53 charter members or Pastor Russell had anything like the current churches in mind when they submitted their will to God's Will. In the year 2000 Pastor Russell wrote,

"When God Builds a Church," listing 10 principles for growing a dynamic church. In the subsequent series of newsletter articles, I will give you my impression of his book, starting now.

I met Pastor Russell shortly after he wrote this book, when their weekend worship attendance was <u>only</u> about 13,000. My first impression was that he was a truly humble man, and I believe that he loves God with all his heart – the center of obedience to God's Will as I have mentioned before. In the fore mentioned book's introduction Pastor Russell wrote, "God does not define success in the same terms that we do. Although we rejoice over our numerical growth, we know that God does not measure success in terms of attendance, offerings, or size of buildings. He measures effectiveness in terms of faithfulness to His Word, conformity to Jesus Christ, and ministry to those in need" (page 8).

In my estimation growth is a by-product of being obedient to God's Will. Many people in the world today are following whatever spiritual path they can to "find their center." As Christians our center is Jesus Christ and what Jesus has revealed to us about God. Jesus said, "I am the way, and the truth,"

and the life" (John 14:6, emphasis added). The first of ten principles that Pastor Russell writes about is "Truth: Proclaim God's Word as Truth and Apply It to People's Lives." Pastor Russell writes, "Truth without love is dogmatism. Love without truth is sentimentality. Speaking the truth in love is Christianity" (page 13).

Part of speaking that truth in love includes speaking truth to ourselves, that our very nature makes us sinful in need of a Savior and rebellious in need of a Lord. Loving God with all <u>our</u> hearts, means being obedient to God's truth lived out in Jesus Christ. 1 John 2:24-25 reads, "Stay with what you heard from the beginning, the original message. Let it sink into your life. If what you heard from the beginning lives <u>deeply</u> in you, you will live <u>deeply</u> in both Son and Father. This is exactly what Christ promised: eternal life, real life!"

As we grow in Christ, whether numerically or not, we need to understand God's Grace in relationship to God's Truth: "Speaking the truth in love is Christianity." As we move forward into the future, however our ministries take shape, we must find a way to deepen our understanding of God's truths so that as Christ-followers we will be equipped to face a changing world with the one thing that does not change: God's love for the world.

SEPTEMBER STEWARDSHIP

It is time to start thinking about and planning for 2025 expenses and offerings. Traditionally October is Stewardship Month in Lutheran congregations, and maybe other denominations. To plan for October, we start in late July or early August. While many do not want to talk about money in the Church, it is necessary.

Financial Advisor Dave Ramsey writes to individuals: "'Work like it all depends on you, but pray like it all depends on God.' When making and living by your budget, prayer is the key that unlocks your ability to join God in what He is doing. **That's not an excuse to sit back and do nothing.** It's simply the admission that no matter how hard we work, it's God's power that fuels every good work, and it's God who crowns our efforts with success."

Shortly after I became Pastor at Redeemer, I started encouraging Redeemer's leadership and congregation to think in terms of a "Spending Plan" for the next fiscal year, rather than a budget. Each Council Member and Ministry Team Leader has been strongly encouraged to develop a well thought out and prayed about spending plan for their respective ministry. We then present that "Spending Plan" to the congregation at the December Annual "Financial Meeting" for a vote.



It quite honestly stretches the thinking and comfort levels of some of our people. Old habits die hard, and many will still call it the "budget." Why not call it a budget? Budgets are drafted to allocate money that a person knows will be incoming for the next year. How much Redeemer will receive in offerings over the next year is never known; so, our finance and stewardship ministry team drafts a spending plan based on previous years, and expected increases in cost of living, in hopes that people will respond and give.

Redeemer has taken seriously our leaderships' work and faith in God. The staff and leadership live out these words by Dave Ramsey, "Work like it all depends on you, but pray like it all depends on God."

Because of God's faithfulness and abundant blessings; because of your commitment to God's work and your trust in God's promise to provide your needs; because of the staff and leadership's commitment to wisely use your offerings; I am blessed to say that offerings have exceeded expenditures almost every year over the nearly twelve years I have been pastor here. That is not because of me, that is because of all of you and our leadership folks.

Thank you all for your generosity and trust in God. Thank you, Council and Ministry Team Leaders, for your commitment to strive toward God's preferred future for Redeemer. Thank you to the staff for keeping this ship on course. Thank you all for your continuing prayers. Thank you, God, for being so faithful, generous, and gracious. We are definitely blessed to be a blessing.



GROWING IN FAITH

Did you do what I did when I was young? I remember seeing those wonderful yellow flowers (dandelions) growing in my parents' grass. Sometimes we would pick them and hold them under someone's chin to "see if they liked butter." Other times those flowers would turn white and fluffy, and when I picked them and blew on them parts of them would fly all over the yard – my parents' yard. I did not understand at the time that I was spreading weeds when I blew those fragments all over the yard. I am now sure my dad would not have appreciated my efforts.




When people are excited about the gospel of Jesus Christ, the Word spreads like those dandelion seeds. Even when Jesus told others not to say anything, they often told people anyway. They simply could not contain their excitement. The good news spread from person to person, family to family, community to community and soon the crowds following Jesus numbered, in some cases, 10,000-15,000.



Have you ever wondered what prevents that spread of the good news today? When you consider your current age, and how long you have been going to church, how many times would you say you have heard the good news? One hundred? One thousand? Ten thousand? A hundred thousand? More? If asked, could you explain the gospel to someone?

On any given weekend less than 35% of Americans attend worship of any kind. Do you care about the "other 65%?" I have had a few people ask, "Why should I care?" Most would say that they care. So, what keeps us from talking to them about Jesus? Is fear the bottom-line? Fear of biblical ignorance? Fear of rejection? Fear of being laughed at? Fear of be labeled a fanatic? Fear of losing friends? Or, some other fear?

Jesus' final words to <u>all</u> Christ-followers were "Go and make disciples..." So, how do we overcome the obstacles of complacency toward the good news, apathy toward non-church-goers, or any number of fears? As with everything we do as Christians we start with prayer, because apart from God none of it would be possible. Pray daily for non-church-goers. Pray daily for strength and knowledge to share the gospel. Pray daily for God to show you someone who is open to hearing the gospel. Afterward pray for them to receive God's Holy Spirit. Then start all over again and repeat.

HOW TO REDUCE THE RISK OF FALLS

September is Fall Prevention month. The following are comments and suggestions from my perspective as a physical therapist, a member of the emergency squad, and as an older adult.

Don't assume that falls are a normal part of aging. Fall risks do increase with age and there are risk factors that make us more likely to fall. Environmental risk factors include



throw rugs and clutter, wet or slippery surfaces, footwear, and obstacles such as pets, corners, or furniture. All of these are similar in that they change stability when attempting to stand on one foot and move the other foot. Socks without non-skid surfaces and flip flops or sandals without a heel strap allow the foot to slip.

Personal habits, such as dressing while standing up, climbing on furniture, footstools, or ladders, or walking barefooted can put us at risk. Check your shoes to make sure they are in good repair, particularly if they are your favorite old shoes.

Medicines and/or medical diagnoses may create problems such as decreased blood pressure when standing or dizziness. If you know these are problems, be particularly careful as you walk.

The American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM) has recommendations for exercise. A substantial amount of research verifies that exercise is one of the best ways to reduce risk of falls and maintain your flexibility, strength, coordination, and endurance. High intensity exercise of any type has been proven to improve balance. Specific balance exercises also improve balance and reduce the risk of falls. Studies have shown that doing balance exercise 10 minutes a day will reduce your risk of falls. One study said as much as a 62% reduction and another study said a 43% reduction.

Plan to attend our program on balance exercises on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>September 17th at 10:30</u>. A light lunch will follow.
